This hit film took over one billion yen at the box office.

This quality piece of Japanese cinema prompts laughter, tears, sadness and sympathy, and is based on a prize-winning Japanese non-fiction book. A detailed record of the life of protagonist and muscular dystrophy sufferer Yasuaki Kano and the volunteers who support him, the film asks what it means to be alive, and was shot entirely on location in Hokkaido, where the author lived.

Director Tetsu Maeda made his theatrical debut in 1998 after a spell as a freelance assistant director. His films often deal with themes of life and living.

The director describes the film as a both a coming of age story centred on Yano, and a love story. It just happens that one of the characters has a disability. That character is played by Yo Oizumi, an actor with a theatre background. From the serious to the comedic, this versatile actor stands out among his peers in Japan for the breadth of his vocabulary and improvisation skills. His acting prowess has bewitched many a director.

In order to fully immerse himself in the role, Oizumi used contact lenses to blur his vision and wore prescription glasses during filming. Though he struggled to get used to his newly distorted vision, the actor says he relished the discomfort as part of the process. For actors so used to expressing themselves physically, it can be stressful to play a part that involves physical restrictions. And yet Oizumi's suppression of his physicality has made room for an impressive range of expression using eyes and eyebrows, volume of voice, and pauses.

Bridging the gap between fact and fiction are two of Japan's most promising young acting talents, Haruma Miura and Mitsuki Takahata. Miura, who plays medical student volunteer Tanaka, last year played the lead in the Japanese production of hit Broadway musical "Kinky Boots", which sold out every one of its 45 performances and led to rave reviews for his singing and dancing. Takahata also gives an excellent performance as the female volunteer with whom Kano falls in love, and was nominated for best supporting actress in the Japanese Academy Awards.

At the same time as impressing on us the seriousness of the protagonist's illness, the film seeks to entertain, and the director has selected and interwoven the most cinematically effective episodes from the book. He says he hopes it will appeal to everyone from primary school pupils to older audiences.
