JANUARY AT BROADWAY

We're starting the new year as we mean to go on with a brilliant programme of eagerly anticipated films for you to enjoy here at Broadway this month. Yorgos Lanthimos (The Favourite, The Lobster) presents his latest feat **Poor Things**, an absurdist black comedy about the adventures of a headstrong young woman brought back to life by an unorthodox surgeon in Victorian England.

Sofia Coppola directs a "dreamy and dark-edged" portrait of the unseen side of Priscilla Presley's turbulent relationship with rock 'n' roll superstar Elvis in **Priscilla**.

Andrew Scott and Paul Mescal star in Andrew Haigh's poignant and haunting drama All of Us Strangers, about grief, loneliness, and love.

A new musical adaptation of Alice Walker's classic novel **The Color Purple** is a decadesspanning tale of love and resilience, and of one woman's journey to independence in the 1900s Deep South.

Anthony Hopkins leads an all-star cast in **One Life**, the incredible true story of London stockbroker Nicholas Winton, who helped save hundreds of Central European children from the Nazis on the eve of World War II.

Journey to the frosty American frontier with Kino Klubb this January as they present a pair of wintry Westerns in their mini season **Snow West** - featuring Warren Beatty and Julie Christie as Old West brothel-keepers in Robert Altman's **McCabe and Mrs. Miller**, and Sergio Corbucci's snow-swept Spaghetti Western **The Great Silence**.

Acclaimed Broadway-based filmmaker Jeanie Finlay joins us for a very special preview and Q&A screening of her new documentary **Your Fat Friend**, charting the rise of writer and activist Aubrey Gordon from anonymous blogger to NYTimes best-selling author and beloved podcaster.

Meanwhile, his drivers' passion to win pushes them to the edge as they launch into the treacherous 1,000-mile race across Italy, the Mille Miglia. Michael Mann's adaptation of Brock Yates' Ferrari biography stars Adam Driver as the founder of Ferrari.

One Life tells the true story of Sir Nicholas 'Nicky' Winton, who, with the help of the British Committee of Refugees in Czechoslovakia, rescued 669 children from the Nazis in the months leading up to WWII. Visiting Prague in December 1938, finding families who had fled from Germany and Austria living in desperate conditions, Nicky immediately realised it was a race against time. How many children could he and the team rescue before the borders closed?

During Britain's post-punk Thatcher years, London's legendary Scala cinema offered community refuge with a programme ranging from established classics and offbeat cult hits to sexploitation, horror, Kung Fu and LGBTQIA+ titles. Nudging the boundaries of convention, the cavernous picture palace acted as a source of inspiration for movie lovers and creatives. Featuring a cornucopia of interviews, archive and film clips, this is an engrossing tribute to an indelible legacy. –LFF

A wild and beautiful firecracker of a film, Yorgos Lanthimos' (The Favourite, The Lobster) period sci-fi is all we have come to expect from this singular filmmaker – and more. When a young woman in Victorian England committed suicide, little did she know how much life lay in store for her. Re-animated by her de facto guardian, the scientist Dr Goodwin Baxter, Bella Baxter's mind soon becomes increasingly alive to the opportunities the world offers. –LFF

When we picture a Western, we think of harsh desert landscapes, tumbleweed, a relentless baking sun, cacti, five o'clock shadow and everything and everyone covered in dust.

This January, we want to lower the temperature and journey to the snow-swept wild frontier; elemental, unforgiving and bitterly cold.

This season, curated by Kino Klubb, presents two of the finest examples of the winter Western - Sergio Corbucci's The Great Silence and Robert Altman's McCabe and Mrs Miller. Both films are set in snowbound communities and offer a revisionist take on the Western dream; a pessimistic and brutal view of the gangster West.

The shrewd Mrs. Miller offers him her experience to help run his business and they join forces opening a brothel, but soon, a powerful company threatens to destroy what they have built.
