

Barnaby Rudge has only one existing television adaptation, from the Sixties, and poor Martin Chuzzlewit, while having been attempted in both the Sixties and the Nineties, only the latter is regularly available. Radio has filled in the gaps somewhat, but it's hardly what we've become accustomed to.

It seems strange, considering we're sure to have at least a thousand further *Twists* and associated spin-offs before the century is out, that commissioners would have left two novels from a writer with such instant name recognition to wither on the vine, but if I understood how the minds of television executives worked, I'd be a wealthier man. And, likely, swanning about in the attic of my mansion in a tattered wedding dress.
